Community Financial Counselling Services (CFCS)

CFCS was founded in 1974 to provide a tax preparation and filing alternative for inner city residents who were being exploited by unregulated tax discounters.



CFCS Programs

CFCS Low Income Tax Program Recent History

- 2008 -CRA withdrew support of the Community Volunteer Income Tax Program (CVITP) in Manitoba and began closing all community tax service centres.
- List of registered CVITP tax "clinics' in Manitoba dropped from 200 to 30
- CFCS agreed to take over management of Winnipeg and surrounding area CVITP programs including:
- volunteer recruitment, coordination, training and retention
- management of one of the largest tax clinics in Canada
- support and coordination of all other Winnipeg tax clinics
- CFCS received funding from the Province of Manitoba, The United Way of Winnipeg and The Winnipeg Foundation to support the low income tax program.
- ▶ 10 years 800,000 tax returns, \$177,000.000.00 refunds/credits



CFCS Low Income Tax Program

CFCS Managed Tax Clinics

- Norquay Bldg. Tax Clinic (downtown Winnipeg)
- Operates mid-February to April 30 4-5 days/week
 9:30 am-3:00 pm
- 18 tax workstations, 84 volunteers, 5 staff
- Millennium Library (Central) plus 5 suburban library branch tax clinics – weekly March/April
- 2 bilingual Provincial Government Service Centre tax clinics – 2 x week March/April
- CFCS tax/access to benefits clinics 2 x week May– November

Support to Other Agencies

CFCS mandate includes encouragement and support to organizations, social services and community groups working with low income populations to provide tax filing and access to benefits for their clients.

Sustainable Livelihood model: Dependent upon capacity of host organization and their community.





Support to Other agencies

- CFCS provides support to 26 agencies within Winnipeg and 4 in rural Manitoba across the range of the sustainable livelihood model.
- New United Way funded program in partnership with SEED to embed financial empowerment programs including low income tax preparation and access to benefits in additional 24 Winnipeg Family Resource Centres



Support to Other agencies

- Assistance with tax clinic set up
- Volunteer Recruitment
- Training in accepting "Drop Off' tax information
- Preparation and filing of drop-offs by CFCS staff/volunteers
- Loans of computers and printers
- Provision of Tax information and resources
- Hosting tax clinics
- In–Person volunteer training



Training Tax Volunteers

CRA webinar volunteer tax training does not meet our needs. CFCS has developed written curriculum for tax training and provides in-person tax training for both agency volunteers and staff:

- Tax Training for New Volunteers
- Update Training for Returning Volunteers
- Advanced Tax Training
- Access to Benefits Training
- Advanced Access to Benefits Training
- New tax volunteer mentoring at the Norquay site before going solo



Volunteer Training 2018 Numbers

- Access to Benefits Training 5 one-day sessions 89 staff/volunteers
- Advanced Access to Benefits 1-one day session–16 staff/volunteers
- Tax Training for First-time Volunteers 4 two-day sessions for 73 staff/volunteers
- Tax Training for Returning Volunteers 4 half-day sessions for 72 staff/volunteers Manitoba Tax Credits (conducted by staff from Manitoba Tax Assistance) 1 half-day session for 65 staff/volunteers
- > 315 training spots, 15 training sessions, 200 staff/volunteers



Access to Benefits

CFCS added an access to benefits component to its large Norquay tax clinic and the May-Nov. CFCS clinic

- Access to benefits specialists on site
- All tax preparation volunteers receive training to recognize where clients might be eligible for additional benefits
- Referral to access to benefits specialist some benefits applications applied for on site, others require further action – may result in referral to CFCS or SEED staff counsellors.
- Tool developed to assist volunteers to use tax file information to determine if there may be eligibility for additional benefits – next slide
- 1,112 Access to benefits applications completed
- \$844,982.17 in known credits/refunds.

Successes

- Recognition of the benefits of tax filing/access to benefits by service agencies, community groups, institutions—increase in interest and in tax clinic numbers. Health Professions—"Get your Benefits" a prime example
- Development of volunteer/staff training programs and supports for emerging tax clinics
- Increase in acknowledgment of benefits and in funding and other supports for tax filing/access to benefits. Demonstrable return on investment shown in dollars returned to low income populations a key factor- much more financial support required.



Challenges

- Despite constant the use of the word "volunteer" hosting a tax clinic requires significant resources—in infrastructure, in training, in staff support. Many agencies do not have the capacity to mount a tax clinic. Many agencies with the capacity are reluctant to allocate scarce resources
- Not an endless supply of tax volunteers, especially experienced volunteers-recruitment and training is an ongoing concern
- Need to change the concept that low income tax filing is a one time event that occurs over a few months every spring. Tax filing and access to benefits must be integrated into year round services for low income populations i.e. adopted in service delivery as a part of Financial Empowerment model.
- Need to broaden limitations for free tax filing-i.e. Self-Employed
