2a) Barriers to access to benefits

- Currently, over \$1.7B in benefits for low- and moderate-income Canadians goes unclaimed each year.
- Accessing government benefits is often very complex and the disability benefits applications are among the most challenging.
- The burden placed on healthcare providers gets passed on to people with disabilities.
- Every step of the application process requires time, energy, connections and access to resources that many applicants lack.
- Benefit application processes are dehumanizing and retraumatizing.

2c) ESDC pilot - Increasing access to benefits

The Increasing Access to Benefits for People with Disabilities Project is a three-year pilot project funded by the Government of Canada's Social Development Partnerships Program – Disability.












2c) ESDC pilot - Project timeline





2c) ESDC pilot – Solution design

- Consider the experiences and perspectives of people with disabilities, system experts, and service providers to identify the best unmet opportunities for access to benefits support.
- Develop a service and tool:
 - Where people feel reflected in the service, created by them.
 - Can be used by people with disabilities and provide ongoing support as their lives change.
 - Can be used by agencies to provide an access to benefits service to remove barriers to benefits access for people with disabilities.



2c) ESDC pilot - Testing a solution

- Give a consistent human relationship throughout the process.
- Activate new advocates and navigators.
- Build a roadmap to follow.
- Humanize the experience with straight talk.
- Get the word out to the most disconnected people.
- Make it accessible to everyone.
- Insights and learnings drive modifications throughout the pilot.



2c) ESDC pilot – Disability Benefits Compass

Disability Benefits Compass

Providing information about the *four key disability benefits* for persons with disabilities in your province or territory.

This site was created for people living in Canada with a severe mental or physical disability or if you have trouble with daily activities and require help from another person, assistive device or animal.

It can be used by people with disabilities, caregivers, family members and organizations who provide access to benefits support.



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2d) What is evaluation?

The process of determining the merit, worth or value of something.

(Scriven M. Evaluation thesaurus. Sage Publications, 1991)

- A process undertaken for purposes of improvement, decision making, enlightenment, persuasion.
 (Shadish W, Cook T, Leviton L. Foundations of program evaluation, 1990)
- Using systematic, data-based inquiries about whatever is being evaluated.

 (American Evaluation Association (www.eval.org), 2004)



2d) What is evaluation? (continued)

An evaluation must be:

- Specifically designed to address the questions being asked and the nature of the intervention or program being evaluated.
- Stakeholder-focused!





This **evaluation** is really going to help our program become more effective.



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2d) Why evaluate?

- To answer evaluation questions:
 - What are the key elements of the service? How does it work?
 - Who are the users and what have their experiences been?
 - What impact has it had on their ability to access benefits? How has it impacted their lives?
 - What works well? What needs improvement?
- To share lessons learned across different groups or locations:
 - What elements of the tool could be scaled up and how?
- To avoid erroneous, expensive conclusions and decisions.
- To justify funding.



2d) Our approach – developmental evaluation

- Flexible and focused on learning to provide feedback throughout.
- Provide timely and relevant information to conceptualize, design and test new approaches.
- Ensure decision-makers can adjust the program/initiative to achieve intended objectives.

Question from audience

1. What can be done to capture if these benefits improve the financial security of people living with disabilities?

Panelist response

Various evaluation methods could help track how access to benefits improves financial security of people living with disabilities. We could measure changes in the number of people with disabilities who are able to access financial benefits and we could also track changes in actual incomes. This could be done through administrative or survey data. Researchers have developed survey questions to measure the financial well-being of people in different circumstances who receive income from different sources and monitor important changes in how they feel about their available resources over time. These measures can be used to understand other dimensions of financial security such as recipients' confidence in the stability of their income and how comfortably they can afford a range of financial necessities. Interviews with people with disabilities about their experiences accessing financial resources could also provide valuable insights.

2. Is the pilot tool available outside BC?

Panelist response

Yes, the <u>Disability Benefits Compass</u> was launched publicly in November 2022 and includes all provinces and territories in Canada. When you go to the website, select your province or territory in the dropdown button located at the top-right of the page.

3. Is there a timeline on the CDB?

Panelist response

The Canada Disability Benefit is a new federal benefit to reduce poverty and to support the financial security of working age persons with disabilities. It was first announced in the throne speech in 2020 and the federal government committed to establishing it in 3 years in budget 2021.

This new federal benefit will be designed as a top up of existing benefits to bring people with disabilities above the poverty line. The CDB Act which will create the framework for this new benefit, is now going through the legislative process. It is in report stage in the House of Commons and awaiting the third reading in the House of Commons. You can view the status at Parliament of Canada.

4. What will this program view as 'poverty line'?

Panelist response

- We cannot comment on the Canada Disability Benefit program specifics in relation to the poverty line. But for general poverty line information, in 2018, Employment and Social Development Canada announced "<u>Canada's First Poverty Reduction</u> <u>Strategy</u>" which establishes the Official Poverty Line for Canada along with a <u>dashboard of 12 indicators</u> (as of March 2022) to track progress on poverty reduction for Canadians and their households.
- As described in Chapter 1, page 11 of the ESDC (Employment of Social Development Canada) publication, <u>Opportunity for All Canada's First Poverty Reduction Strategy</u>, the poverty line is based on the cost of a basket of goods and services that individuals and families require to meet their basic needs and to achieve a modest standard of living in communities across the country. Much more information can be found in that document.

5. Are there risks that Provinces will either leave money on the table or claw back from existing programs?

Panelist response

As the details of the Canada Disability Benefit are not yet known, any risks that provinces will leave money on the table or claw back from existing programs remains to be determined.

6. How do we get access for people with disabilities over the age of 65?

Panelist response

- A number of disability-specific services for specific groups, such as senior citizens, can be found by connecting with non-profits and charities in your community that directly serve senior citizens. There is also the Office of the Seniors Advocate in BC for example.
- Please also refer to the <u>Benefits Wayfinder Disability Support starting point</u> to learn about common disability support benefits available. You can also view the <u>Benefits Wayfinder Senior/Retired starting point</u> to view common senior/retired person benefits. You can also complete the <u>Benefits Wayfinder questionnaire</u> to get a more customized listing of potential benefits related to your personal situation.
- Please first select your province or territory before beginning.
- You can also refer to the <u>Disability Benefits Compass</u>, which will give you more step-bystep information on the three key Federal Disability Benefits and one provincial or territorial disability assistance.

7. How much can a physician or nurse practitioner charge to review and sign your DTC (Disability Tax Credit) application?

Panelist response

- Medical practitioners are allowed to charge you a fee of any amount for DTC support as
 this service is not covered by the government. While some practitioners do not charge a
 fee, typical fees are between \$50 to \$200. Applicants may need to pay a separate fee for
 each time they require application support.
- Remember, you are not required to pay this fee before your medical practitioner completes the application. You are still entitled to application support if you need to pay after it is completed.
- If you owe taxes, you can claim the fee as a <u>medical expense</u> (line 33099 or line 33199 of your income tax return).
- Some medical practitioners are willing to reduce or waive the fees, if you explain that you cannot afford it.

8. Will someone be able to access the physician or nurse practitioner listed online and how then would they share their medical records?

Panelist response

In the <u>Disability Benefits Compass</u>, there is a resource page to <u>help you find a doctor or nurse practitioner</u> who will work with you on your disability benefit application form. Once you find a doctor or nurse practitioner to work with, you would need to discuss with them how you would share your medical records. Medical records are not shared using the Disability Benefits Compass.

Panelist response

We do not know yet how the Canada Disability Benefit will interact with provincial or territorial benefits (like ODSP). We hope this will be outlined once the CDB is passed.

12. Are you collecting the organizations' information for folks who need support in their reapplication for DTC or initial application?

Panelist response

- We are always looking to add to our Disability Benefits Compass and Benefits Wayfinder help pages, those organizations who help folks with access to benefits support (example: helping to apply for the Disability Tax Credit certificate, or reapply if a disability application has been denied, plus other access to benefits supports).
- We only include organizations who do not charge a fee to help a person with access to benefits support.

14. I, my wife, and 3 diagnosed kids struggle to get Disability tax credit applications approved because of a dearth of primary care providers. What would your next smallest steps be for this program to connect disabled persons with the primary care providers they need to obtain benefits and services?

Panelist response

We are sorry to hear you and your family are having much difficulty in finding a primary care provider and the resulting difficulty in being able to complete the Disability Tax Credit certificate application. Please refer to the Disability Benefits Compass page titled <u>How to find a doctor or nurse practitioner who will work with you</u>. It is a listing, by province and territory, of places to contact to find a doctor or medical professional to work with you.

15. Do you know if this benefit will be based on a family income or the person themselves?

Panelist response

For the Canada Disability Benefit, we do not know the details on eligibility yet. We hope to hear the details once it has passed all levels of the legislative process.
